## IB Bilingual Diploma Programme

International Baccalaureate® (IB) programmes are taught for the purpose of developing learners who are motivated to succeed and to build a better world through intercultural understanding and respect

At CFIS, beginning in September 2019, the IB bilingual Diploma Programme will support our academic offering for students in grades 11 and 12. The program's tenets are aligned with CFIS' mission to support academic excellence and the whole child and will augment our school's current approach to inquiry-based learning, critical and innovative thinking, analysis and synthesis of knowledge, and demonstration of learning.

## About the IB Diploma Programme

In early January 2019, CFIS was approved as an IB World School to offer the Diploma Programme (DP) to its Grade 11 and 12 students beginning in September 2019.

Within an IB Diploma Programme, students may take a full IB Diploma or choose to complete one or more certificates in IB courses. There are six subject areas: Studies in Language and Literature, Language Acquisition, Individuals and Society, Sciences, Mathematics, and the Arts. A key aspect of the IB curriculum is teaching students to develop their thinking, communication, social, self-management and research skills. Teaching in IB is based on inquiry, focused on conceptual understanding, developed in local and global contexts, focused on effective teamwork and collaboration, differentiated to meet the needs of all learners, and informed by assessment.

There are three core components of the full IB Diploma - the Theory of Knowledge (TOK) course, a 4,000-word independent Extended Essay (EE), and a Creativity, Activity and Service (CAS) portfolio. TOK brings together all the academic disciplines and focuses on the nature of knowing, while CAS provides opportunities for self-determination, reflection, collaboration, and enjoyment. The EE provides an avenue to deeply explore a subject of the student's choice, under the guidance the EE coordinator.
